

The First Reading

Reader: A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah.

Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken."

A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?"

All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand for ever.

Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him.

The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed.







Music Notes: Edgar Frederick Day, the composer of this morning's Anglican Chant, resided with his parents at the parish rectory in Hazleton at the beginning of his music studies. In 1912 he began studies with Ivor Atkins, becoming his first assistant to at Worcester Cathedral. From 1921-1941, Day was music master at the College for the Blind in Worcester. In 1922 he became music master of King's School Worcester. He was also conductor and accompanist for the Worcester Festival Choral Society and Worcestershire Orchestral Society, 1934-1950. Among his compositions for the Anglican Church are a *Magnificat* and *Nunc Dimittis* in B flat, a *Te Deum* and *Jubilate Deo* in B minor, and a Communion Service in B flat.
